## Course Description

My name is Professor Stonis, and I am excited to take a journey through United States history with you! I will play an active role in the course, and I am here to help. You can expect me to create a positive and interactive learning environment that includes helpful announcements, facilitating robust discussions of course concepts, timely feedback, and guidance on all coursework.

This course is a survey of the political, social, economic, and cultural development of the United States from European “discovery” through Reconstruction. The course content will focus on the colonial era, establishment of the new nation, sectional problems, national growth, disunion, and Reconstruction. More specifically, the English colonies; the Revolutionary War; the Constitution; the New Nation; Jeffersonian and Jacksonian democracy; slavery; the Civil War; and Reconstruction are all examined. Material may be covered chronologically or topically. The central tenet of this course will be shifting concept of freedom throughout United States history as we explore the power dynamics that continuously evolve around key themes such as race, class, and gender.

I am an Instructor of United States history and United States women's history at Glendale Community College. I previously taught at CSULB, a private university, and several other community colleges. I combine historical knowledge, critical thinking skills, and current pop culture media to facilitate learners' understanding of the past so we can work together through civic engagement to build a more equitable future. I completed my Bachelor's degree in history at UCLA where I was awarded the Mary Ritter Beard Scholarship for the best women's history research paper in the History Department. I completed my Master's degree in history with an emphasis on the United States, and I earned the Best Thesis in the College of Liberal Arts for my thesis entitled "'On Heathen Ground': The Double Bind of Women's Roles in the Sandwich Islands Mission, 1819-1863." I was recently featured on the [52 Feminists website](#) about the intersection of history, feminism, and civic engagement.

As the rapper Drake once said, "Sometimes it's the journey that teaches you a lot about your destination." My educational journey led me to want to help students achieve their personal academic goals while realizing that history matters. I will encourage us to see history as more than only places, dates, and names, but rather as an interconnected web of stories that still have something important to impart to us today.

#### LMS – Canvas:

### Turn-On Auto-Save Text:

- For Chrome: [Typio](#) automatically saves text as you type and lets you easily recover input data in case of loss. You are in full control of which sites auto-save is enabled on and how long the input is saved. Typio is lightweight and secure, your data never leaves your computer.
- For Firefox Mozilla: [Form History Control](#) manages form history entries (search, edit, cleanup, export/import) and easy text form-filler. Auto-save text entered in any form while typing allows fast recovery when disaster strikes.

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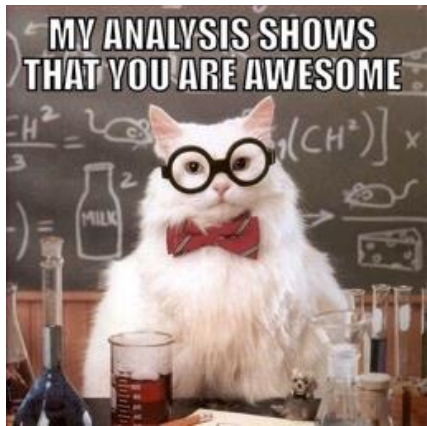
## Important Notes
